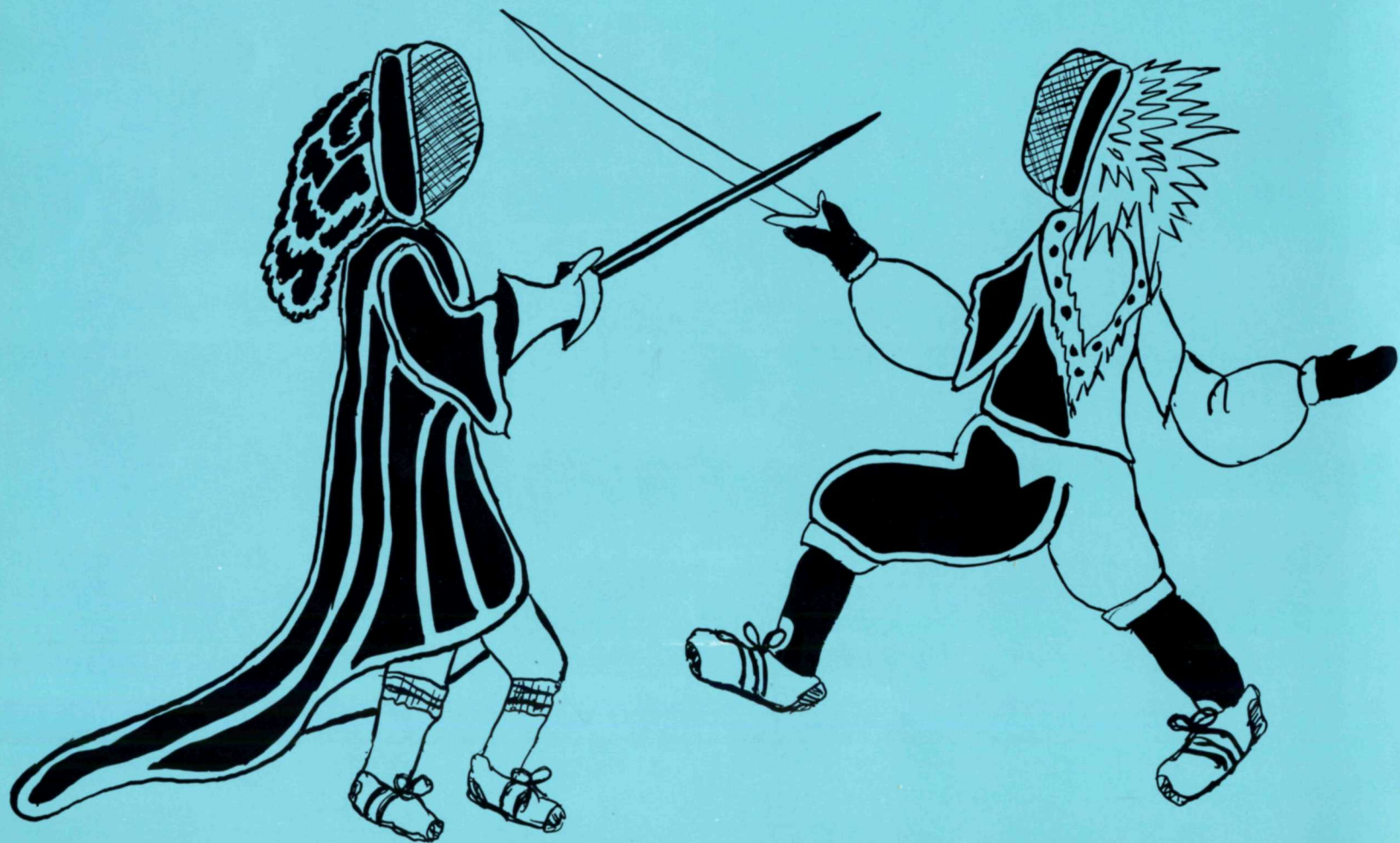
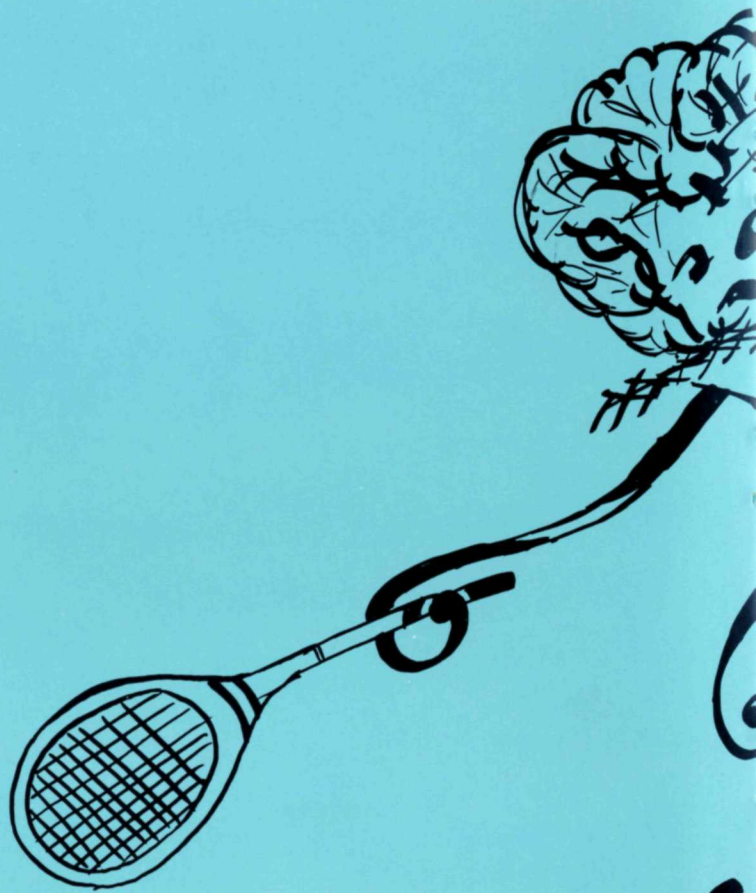

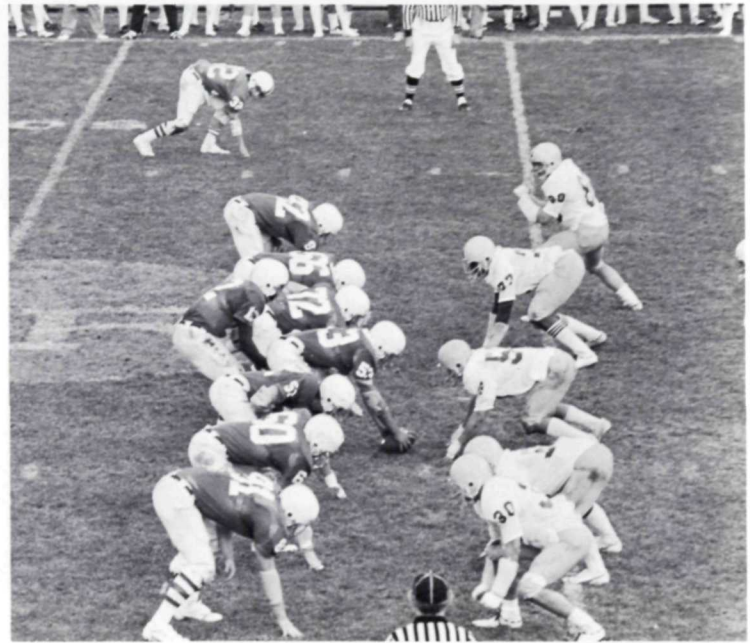

After getting off to a fast start with resounding victories over Oberlin, 30-14, and Centre College, 23-0, the Spartan Football Team became untracked after losing the services of star running back Kerry Williamson and lost their last seven games. One of those losses was a tough 17-14 defeat at the hands of Carnegie-Mellon, who were the PAC champions and rated 7th nationally in Division III. However, the team scored 97 points this season, their highest tally since 1974.

Despite the poor record, Coach DelRosa had many outstanding performances to be proud of. Senior Al Malik (TE), and juniors Mike Rogan (DE), Andy Katz (DLB), and Bob Graumann (OG) made the All-PAC team. Malik was also picked as the team MVP.

Many individual records were set. Malik set five receiving records: yards gained in a season (413), and career (1010), and three pass catching marks. Tim Butler set passing records for attempts (35), and completions (17), in the Allegheny game, and Bob Herald set a new standard by punting ten times in the same game. Two team marks set were: yards rushing (299 vs. Centre), and yards passing (175 vs. Bethany) in a game.

Under the able leadership of Coach Bill Sudeck, the swift-footed Spartans upped their NCAA Division III record to 66 consecutive dual meet triumphs with a 6-0 season. Three-time All-American Pete Kummant led the squad, followed closely by the famed "six-pack", whose members varied among juniors Pat Carey, Mark VanderHaar, and Bruce Woodcraft, sophomore star John Humphrey, and freshman standouts Joe Harryhill, Rich Williams, and Mike McDevitt.

The Spartans finished a respectable third in the PAC after injuries sidelined two key runners. Kummant captured both the individual PAC title and All-Ohio honors for the fourth time. Host Case-Reserve placed 7th in the NCAA Great Lakes Regional Championships, and Kummant finished 37th in the NCAA National Championships.







With a late season surge, the 1978 Spartan Soccer Team evened its record at 6-6. Mike DiRobertas replaced veteran Coach Harbak at the helm midway through the season after an accident prevented him from finishing the year. The booters outscored their last three opponents 8-2, gaining wins over Bethany (2-1), Malone (3-0), and W&J (3-1).

Leading this year's squad were Aziz Bouckhechba and Wolfgang Urban, both earning berths on the All-Pac and All-Ohio teams. Aziz also received an Honorable mention on the All-Midwest team, while Jim Zwiefel was awarded Honorable Mention in the conference.

Dan Haroune led all scoring with 7 goals and Mike Carey led the defense with two shutouts as team finished second in the PAC with a 4-2 record behind undefeated Allegany.

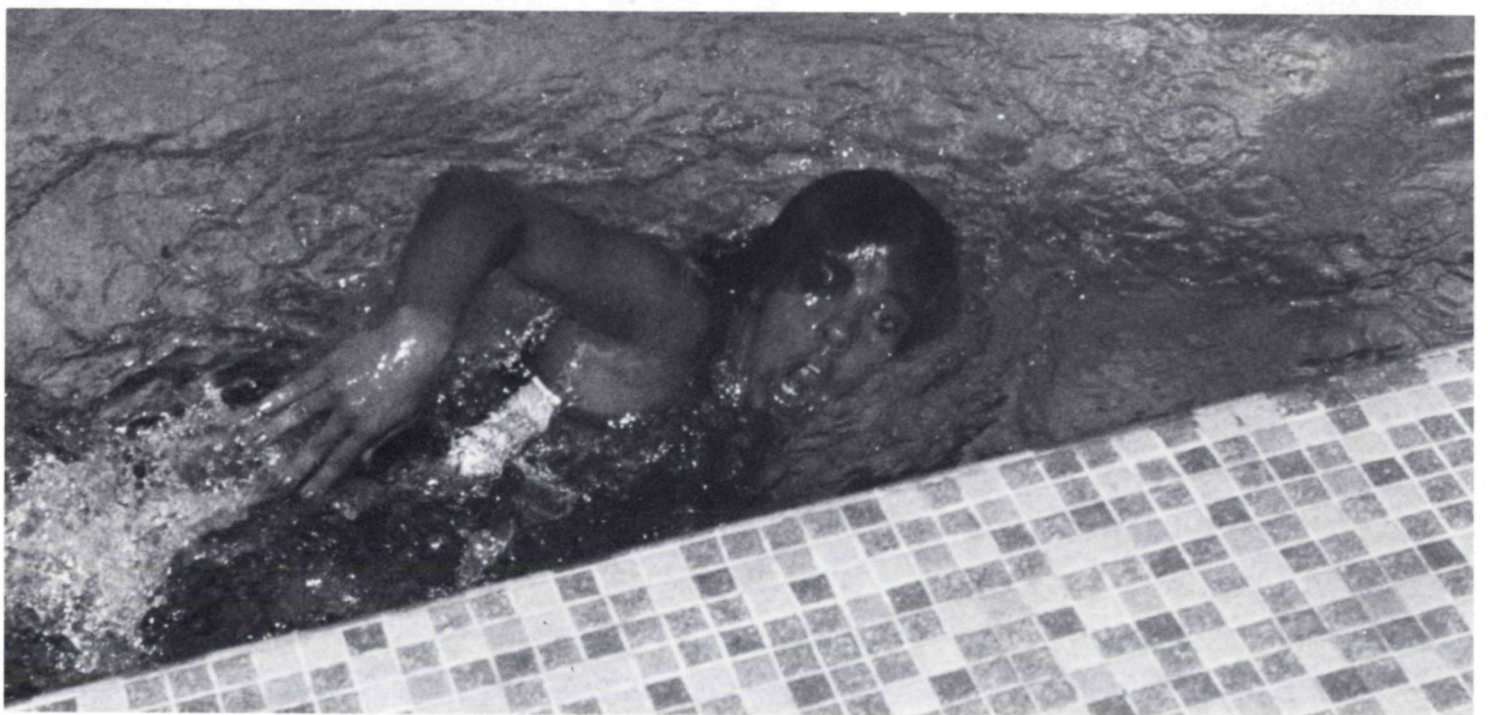
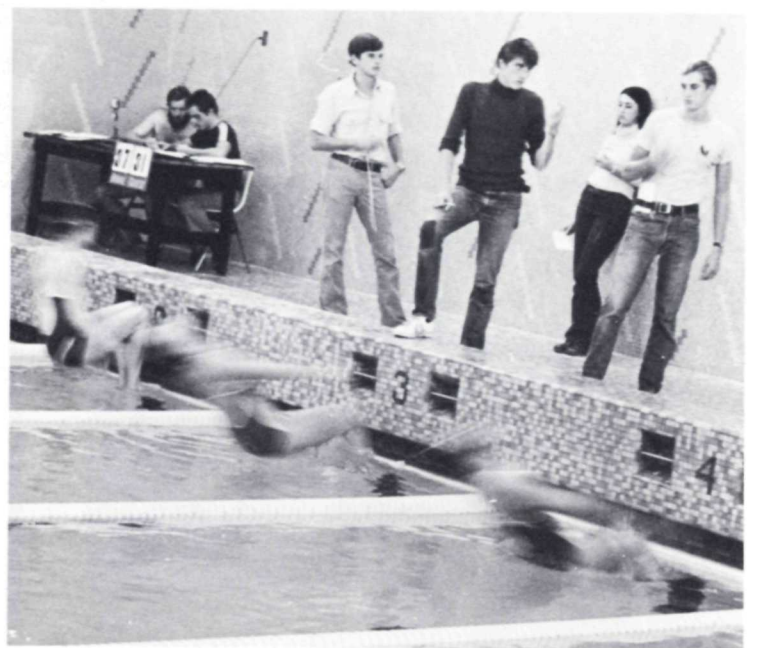
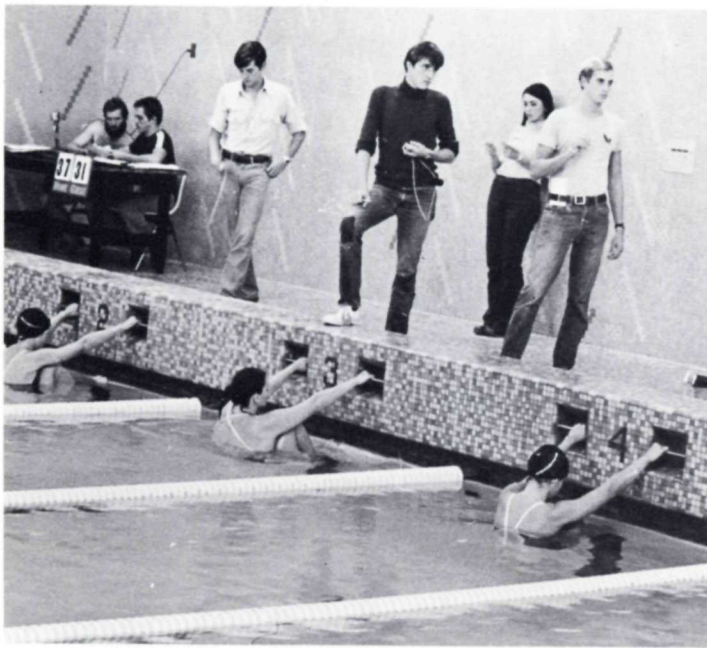


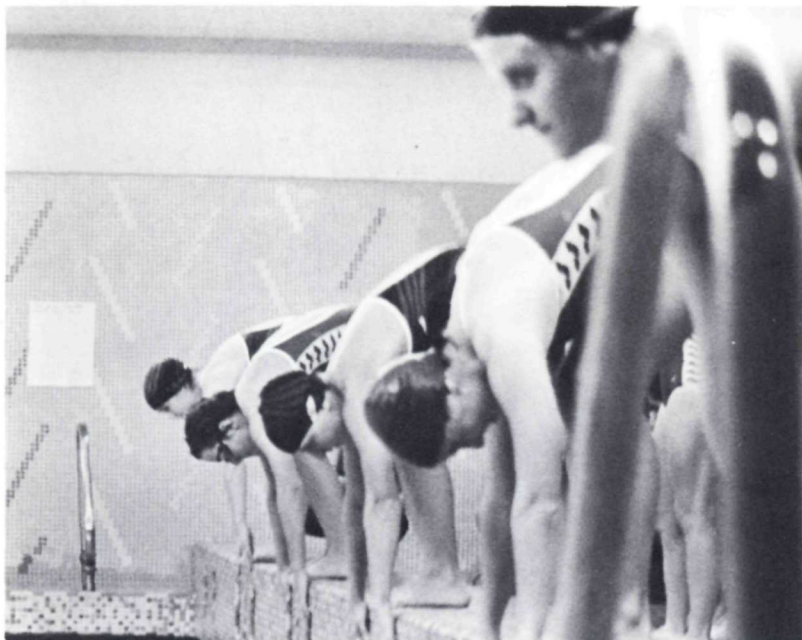
After getting off to a fast start which included victories over Oberlin (2-0), Tri-C West (2-0), Ursuline (2-0), and a tough Lorain (2-1) team. Coach Mina Moore's spikers coasted to a fine 10-5 record-their best ever.

Leading the team were co-captains Daiva Marcinkevicius, top spiker, and Patty Jirousek, the top server with 91% of her serves being good. Ricki Long was the team's best setter. Freshman standouts were Laura Sobieraj and Marsha Groshong.

After an exciting win over Baldwin-Wallace (2-0), the volleyball team closed the season with three straight wins, narrowly missing the State Small College Tournament.

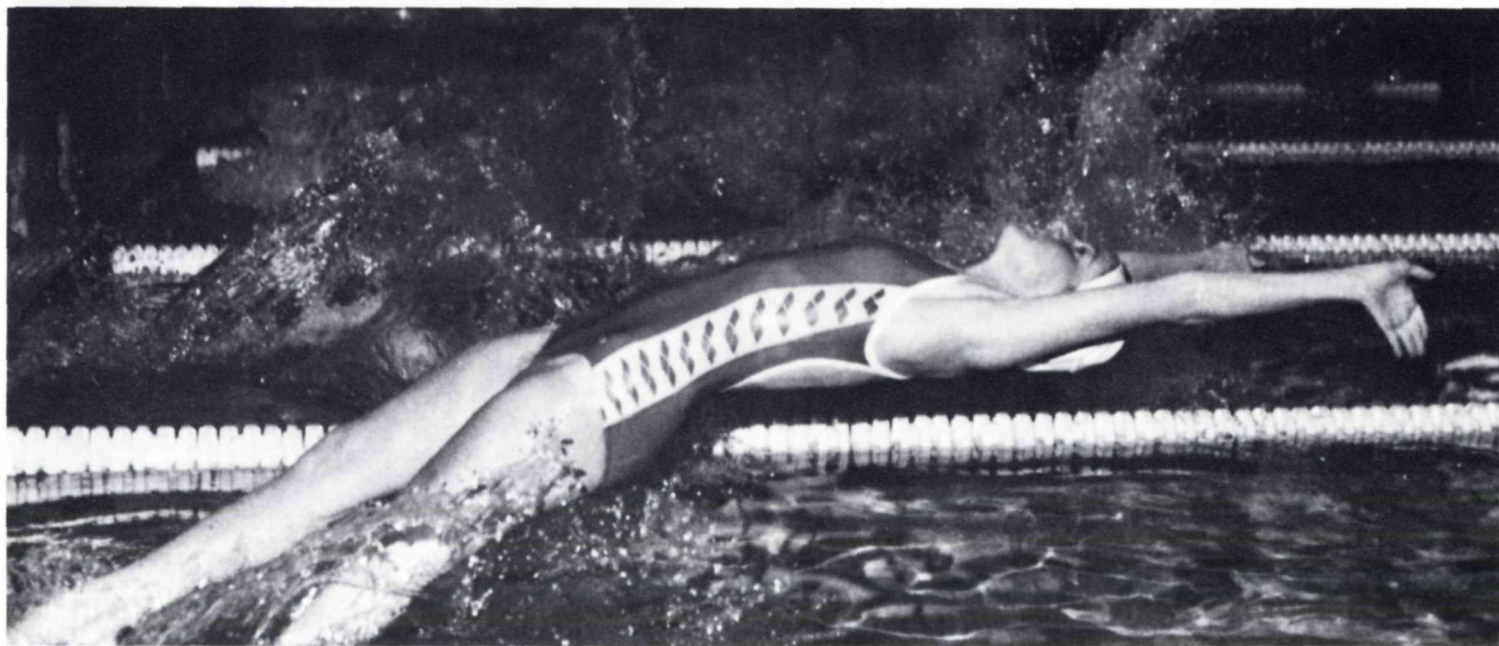






Following in last year's footsteps, the women swimmers broke 9 of the 14 records, including both of the relay marks. Paula Koenig, continuing her assault on the record board, established two more mermaid standards in the 50-yard breaststroke and the 200-yard medley relay, along with J. Polaschek, T. Moosbrugger, and J. Davis. Paula also owns three more individual records. In addition to the medley relay record, freshman Davis also set new standards in the 50 and 100-yard freestyle events and the 200-yard freestyle relay. Janet Bishop, freshman distance standout, set the mark in the 500-yard freestyle with a time of 6:00:1.

Polaschek led the tankers to a sixth place finish in the 1978 All-Ohio Small College Championships by winning the 50-yard butterfly, and placing in four other events. Coach Jan Borer was pleased with the team's 7-3 slate, and especially with their best State showing ever. Tough losses to Oberlin (twice), and Kenyon (the State Champs) were overshadowed by satisfying victories over Baldwin-Wallace and Tri-C West.





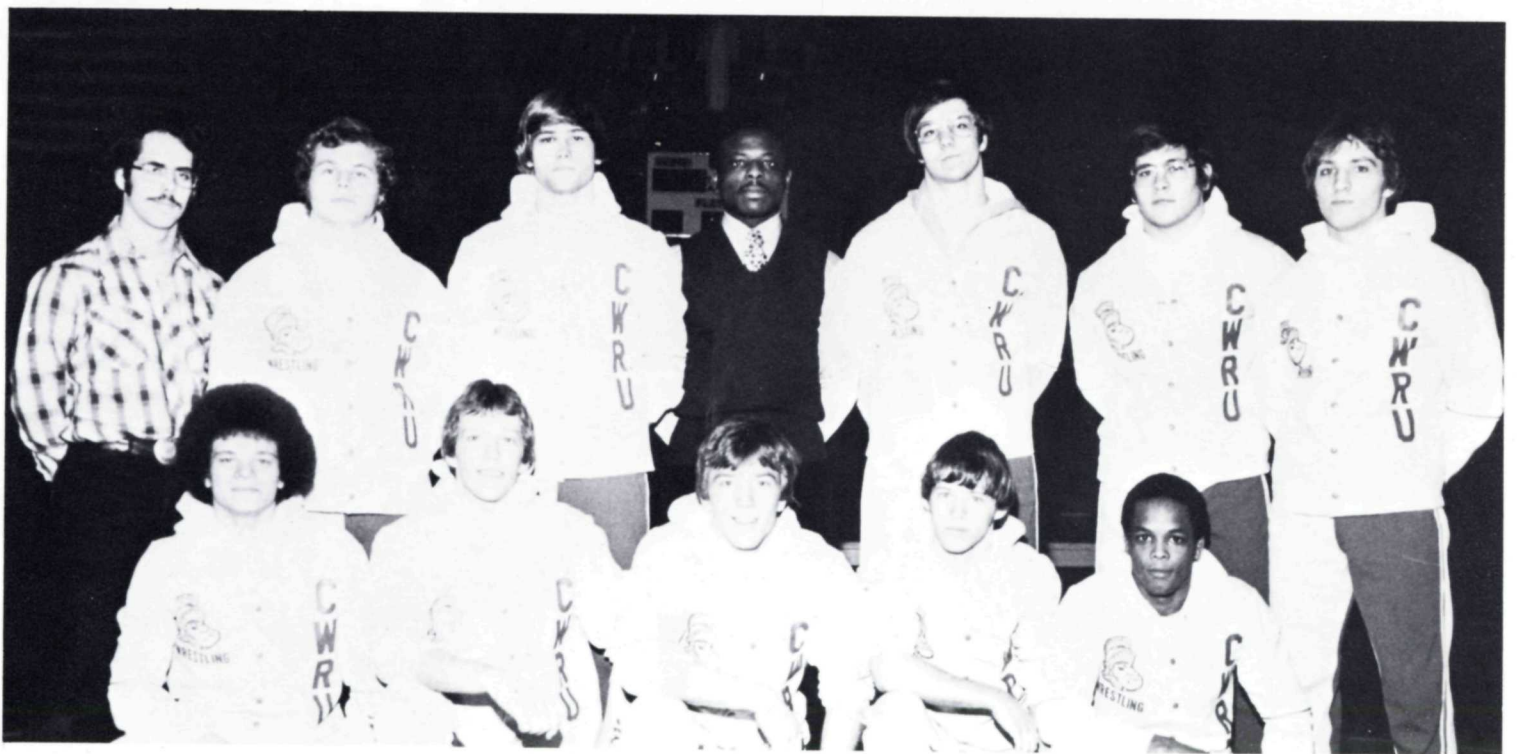
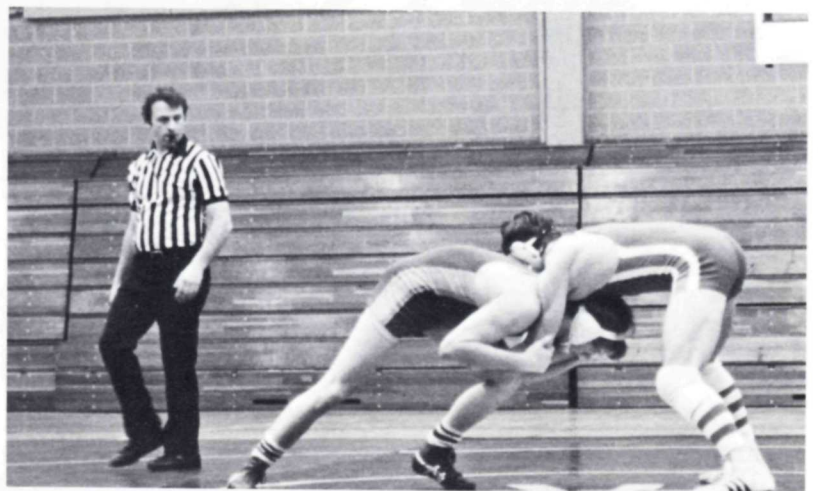
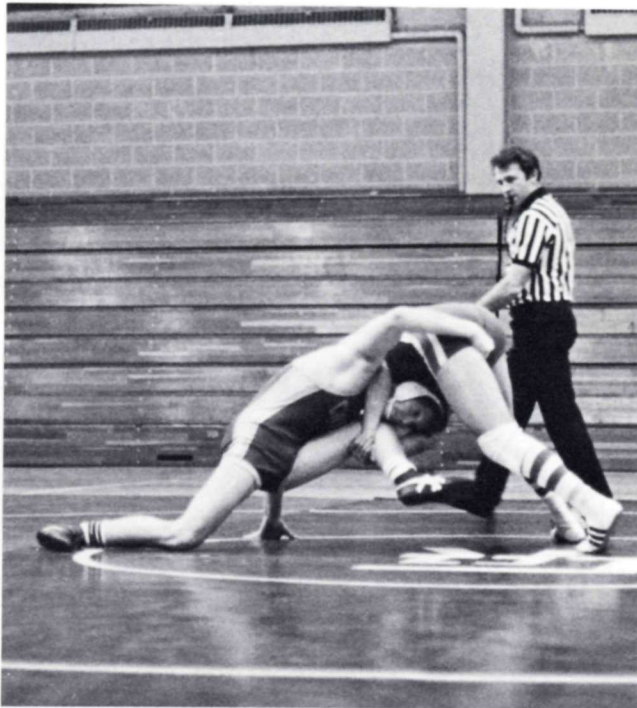

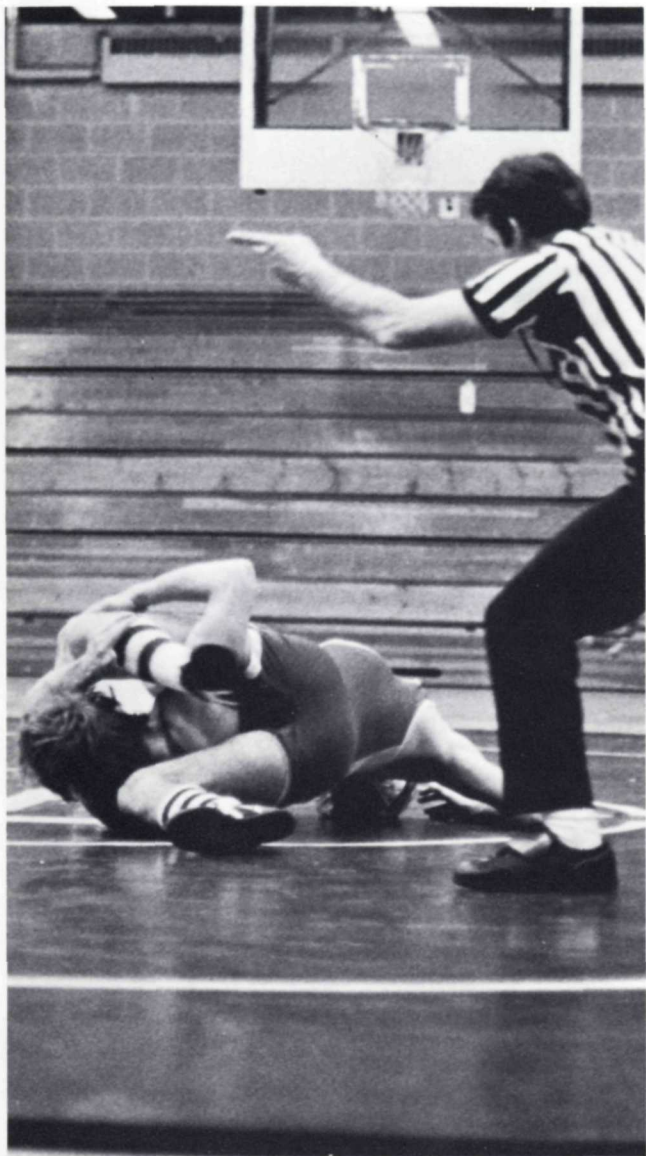
The 1978-79 basketball season was marked by many fine performances and close games. Unfortunately, Coach Bill Sudeck's dunkers wound up with a 5-17 overall record and a 3-11 PAC mark which included five games lost by 5 points or less, and two games lost in overtime; W & J (87-75) and Bethany (83-77). Exciting victories over Allegheny (91-78), JCU (81-80), Johns Hopkins (77-76), and Wilberforce (95-86) highlighted the season.

Team records set were: Most points per season with 1721; FT attempts per game (44) and FT per game (32) both vs Allegheny; and FT percentage per game (.961) vs Wilberforce. Individual records included: Rebounds per game (21) and Rebounds per season (250), both by Rich Wile; and FT made per game (13) by Steve Dan. Ken Jackson (17 ppg and .778 FT%) and Rich Wile were chosen as the team's top players and for the ALL-City Second Team for both. Jackson was also picked for All-PAC honors.





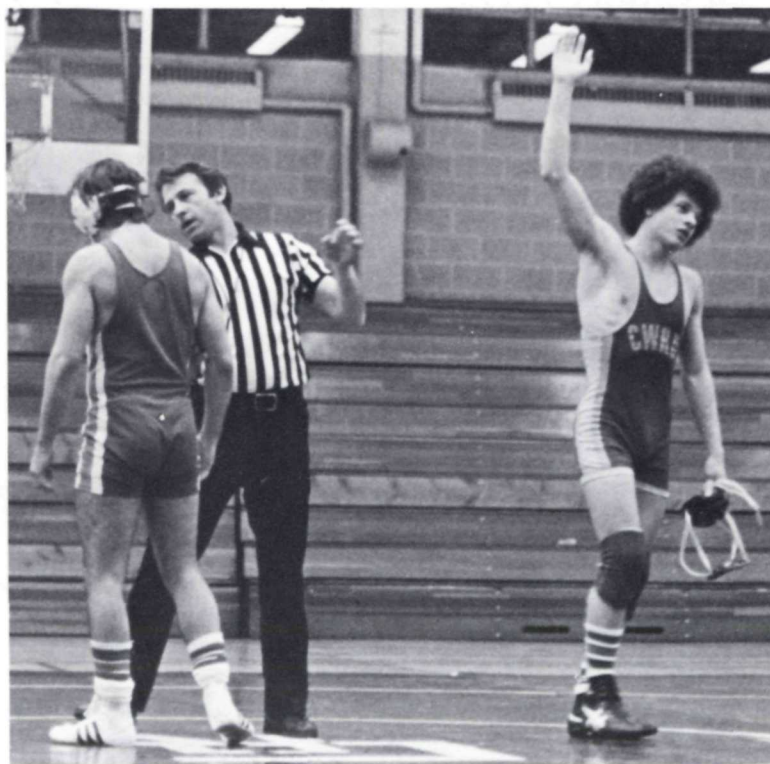
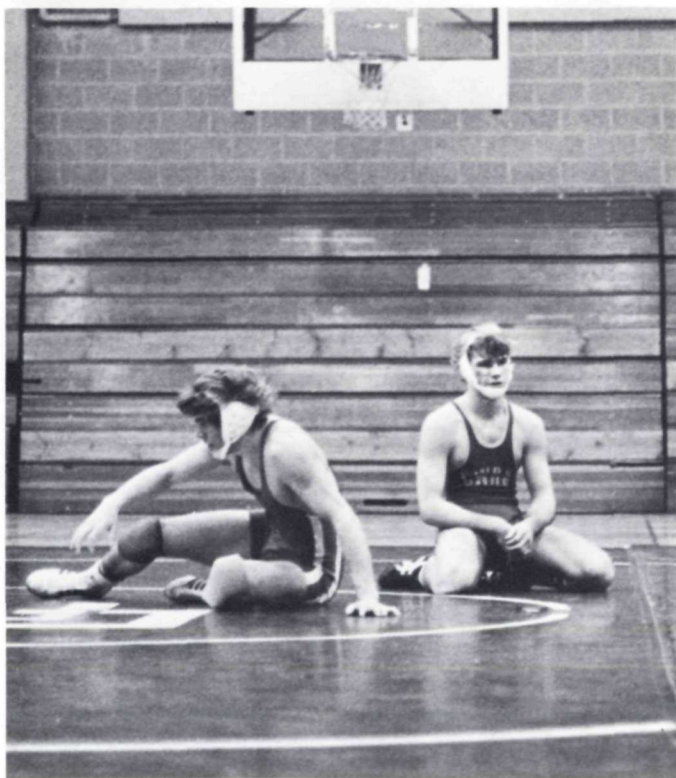
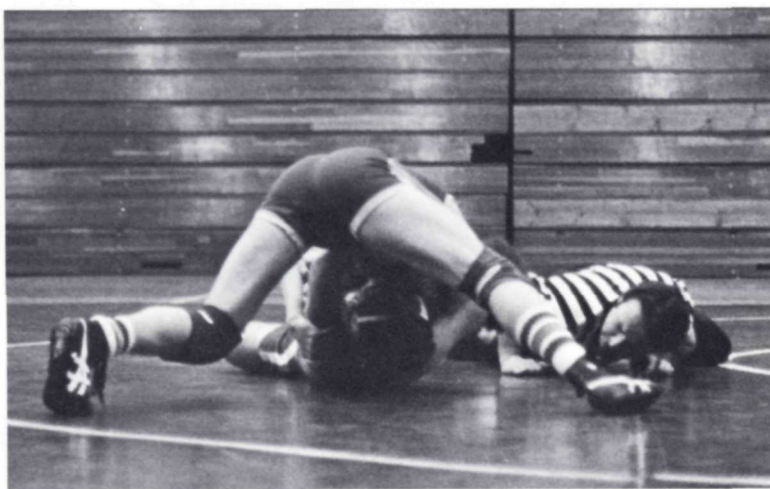

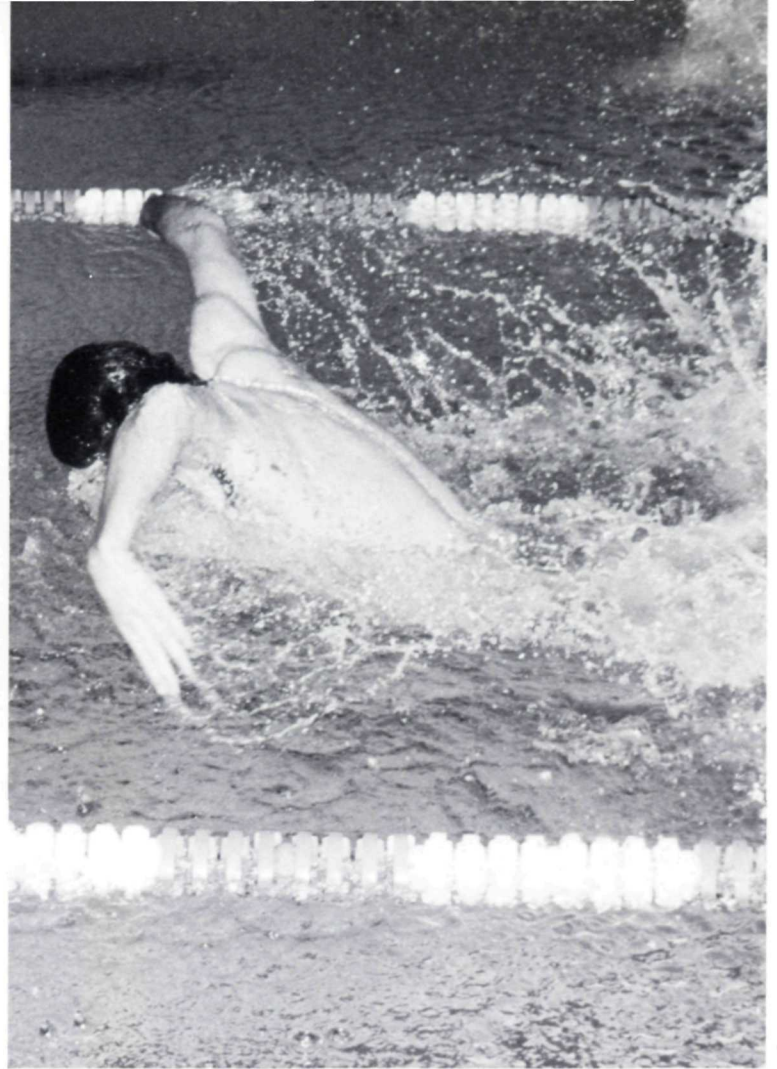
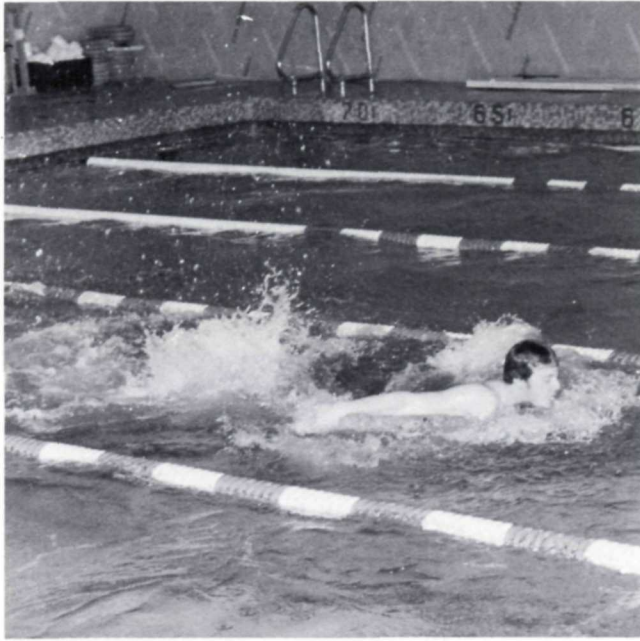


Outstanding! Outstanding is the way to sum up the 1978-79 wrestling season. After a dismal 3-7-1 record last year, Coach Jay Hunt led a talented squad of grapplers to a fine 13-3 overall record, their best ever. They were 3-2 in the PAC. The team was undefeated at home and finished the season with five straight victories.

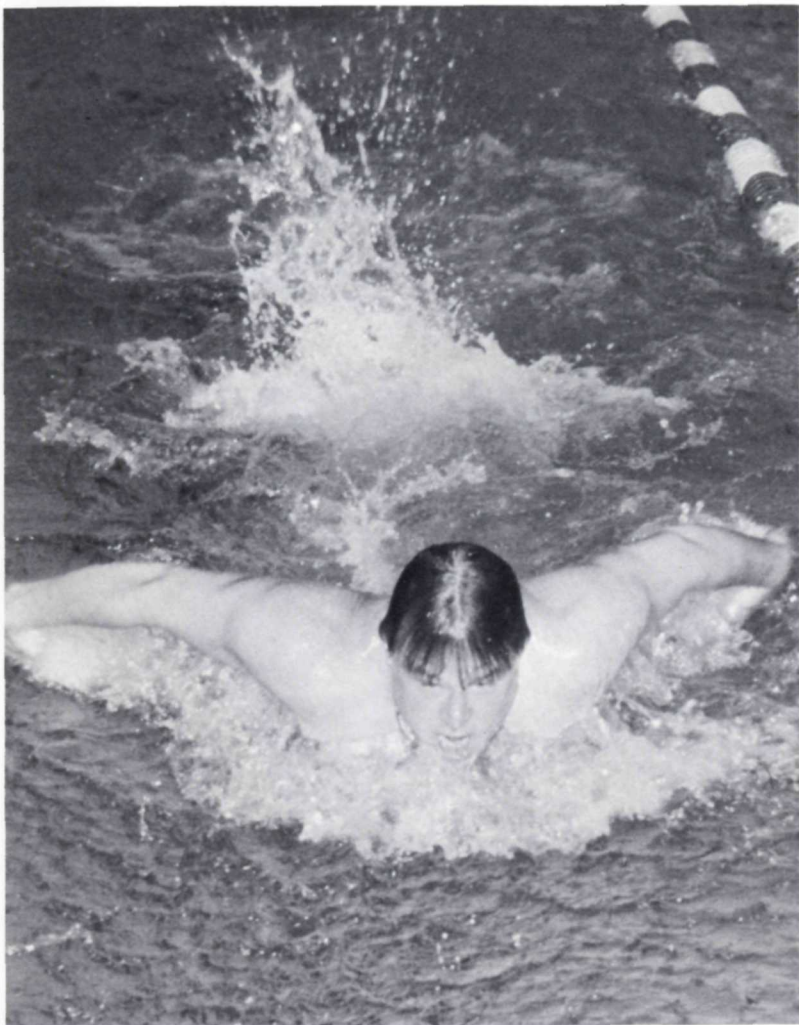
Four wrestlers qualified for the Nationals in which CWRU placed 31st out of over 300 teams. The four wrestlers are Brad Woodall (12-4), Jeff Yawn (13-2-1), Bruce Mueller (14-2) and freshman Mike Dziak (16-0).

In the PAC Championships, which were held at CWRU, the Spartans placed 6th with 26 points, only two behind 4th W&J. For the 13th year in a row, John Carroll won the league title. Next year, they will be aiming to upset the Blue Streaks as perennial champs.



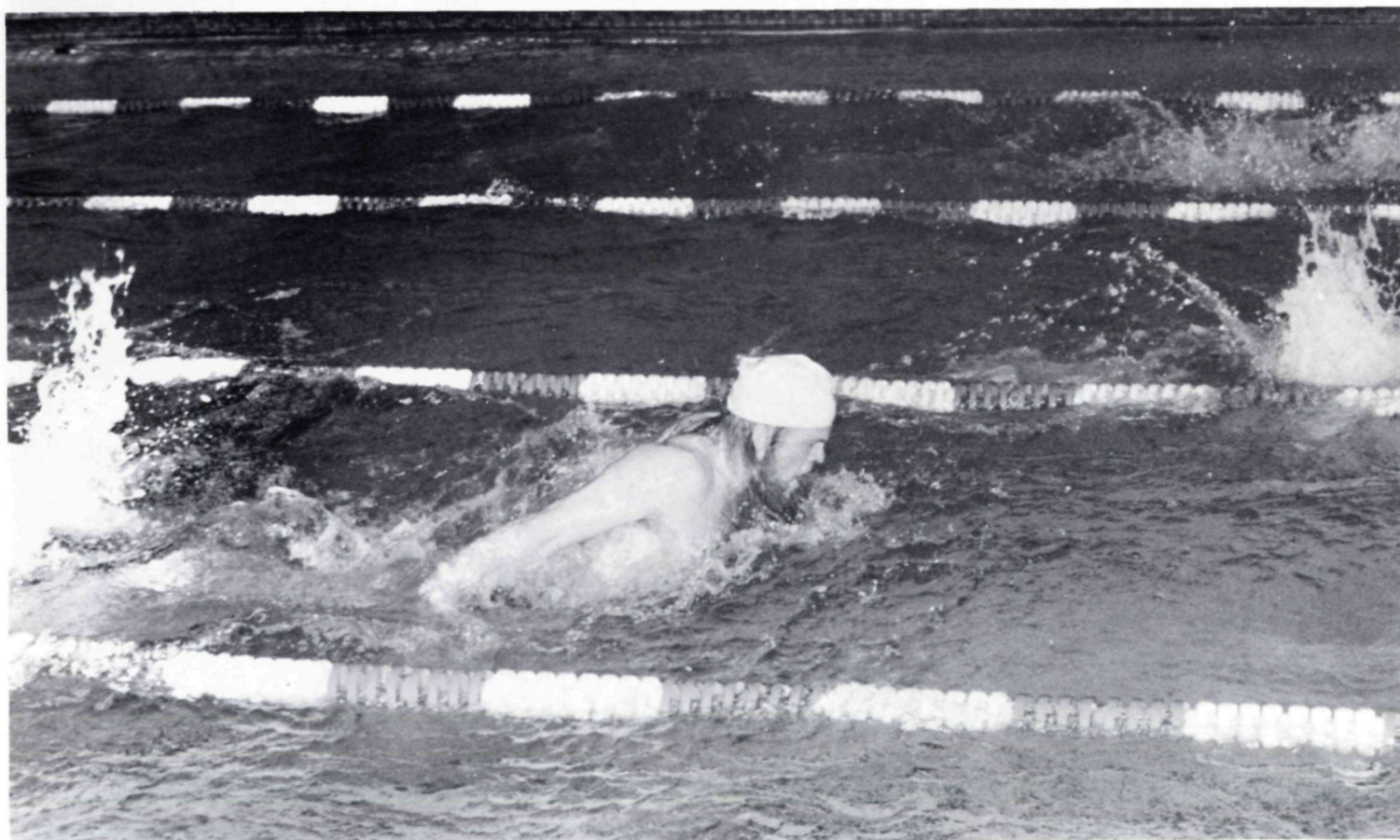


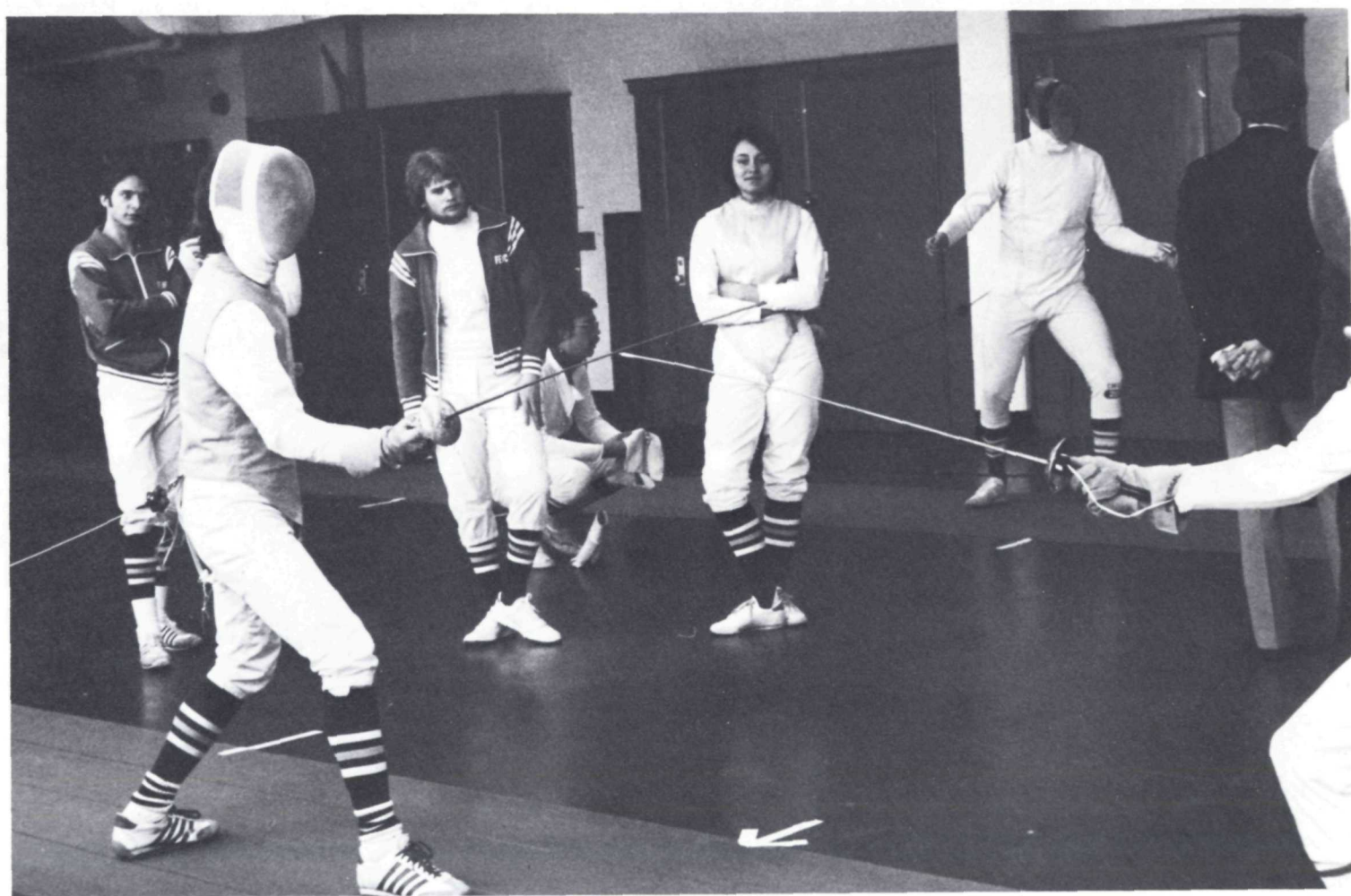
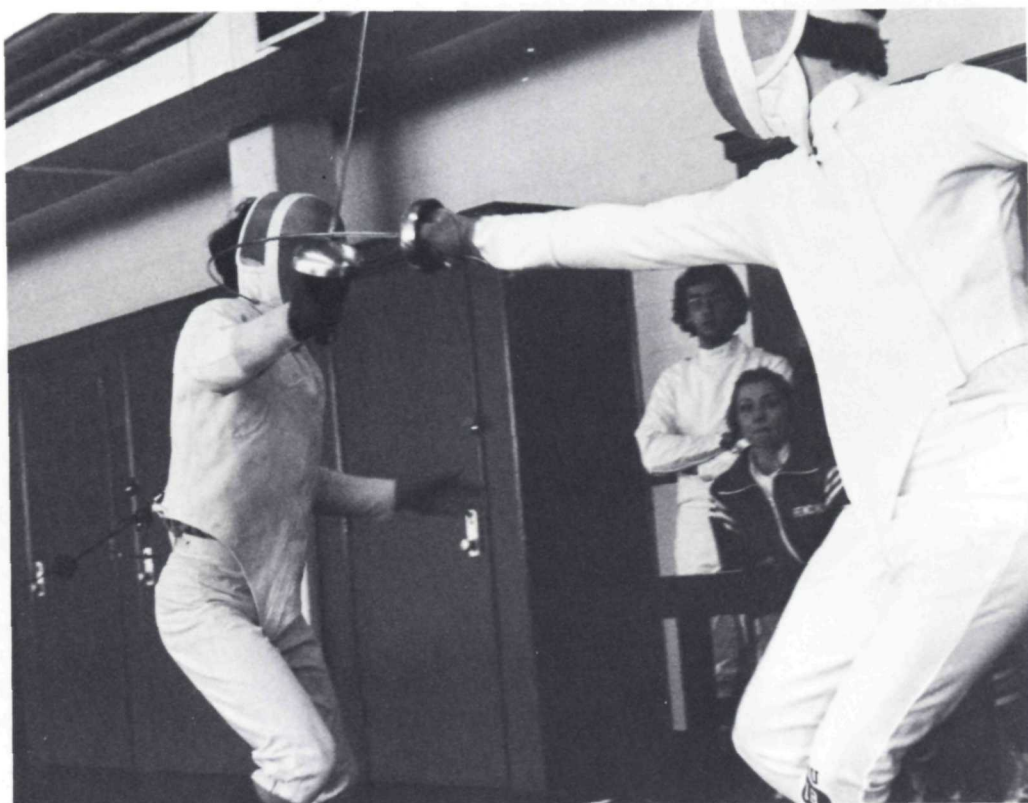

In his first year at the helm, Coach Tim Hable guided his team to a good PAC record. Twelve new varsity records were established marking the significant improvements of the team over last year. A few of the records set were the 200 yard backstroke by Didi Gravenstein in 2:05.6, the 400 yard medley by Doug Conrad in 4:28.9, the 1650 yard freestyle by Jay Watson in 17:07.1, and the 400 yard freestyle relay mark broken by Conrad, Jacobson, Foundoulis, and Stultz.

In the PAC Championships, CWRU placed 5th out of seven teams, ahead of Hiram and Bethany, as there was a mix-up in the entering of events. Allegheny won the title for the 7th time. Sophomore Conrad and senior Petot qualified for the NCAA Division III National Finals. Conrad placed 15th in the 200 yard backstroke and Petot finished 35th in the one meter diving.





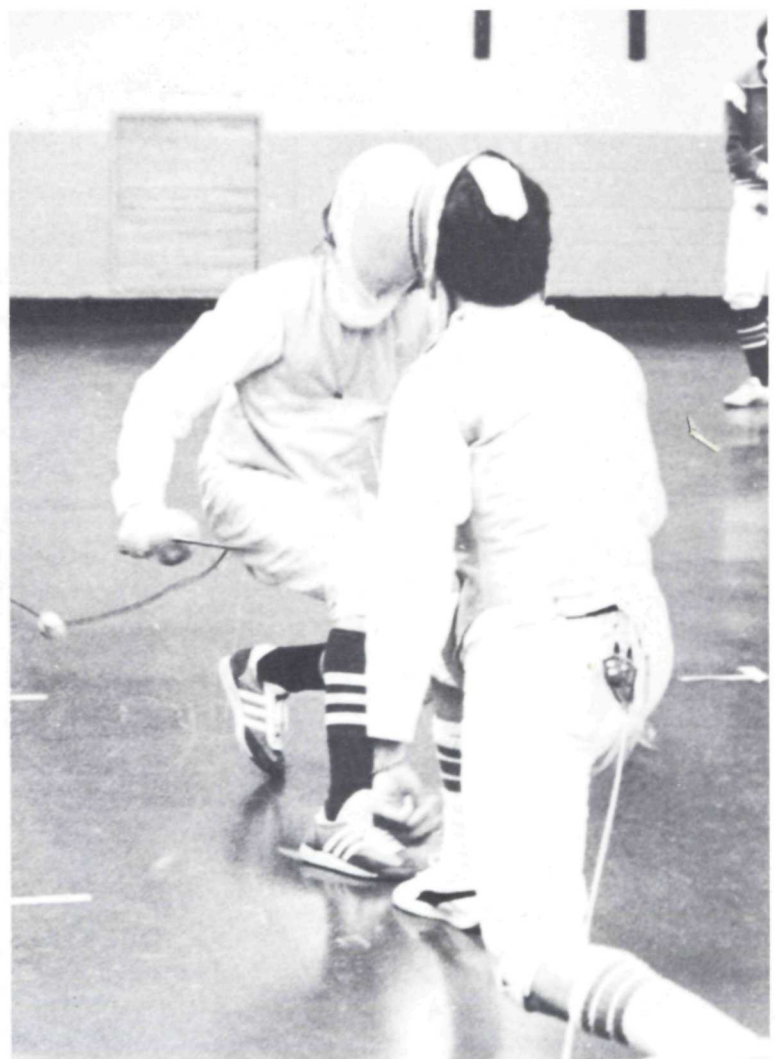
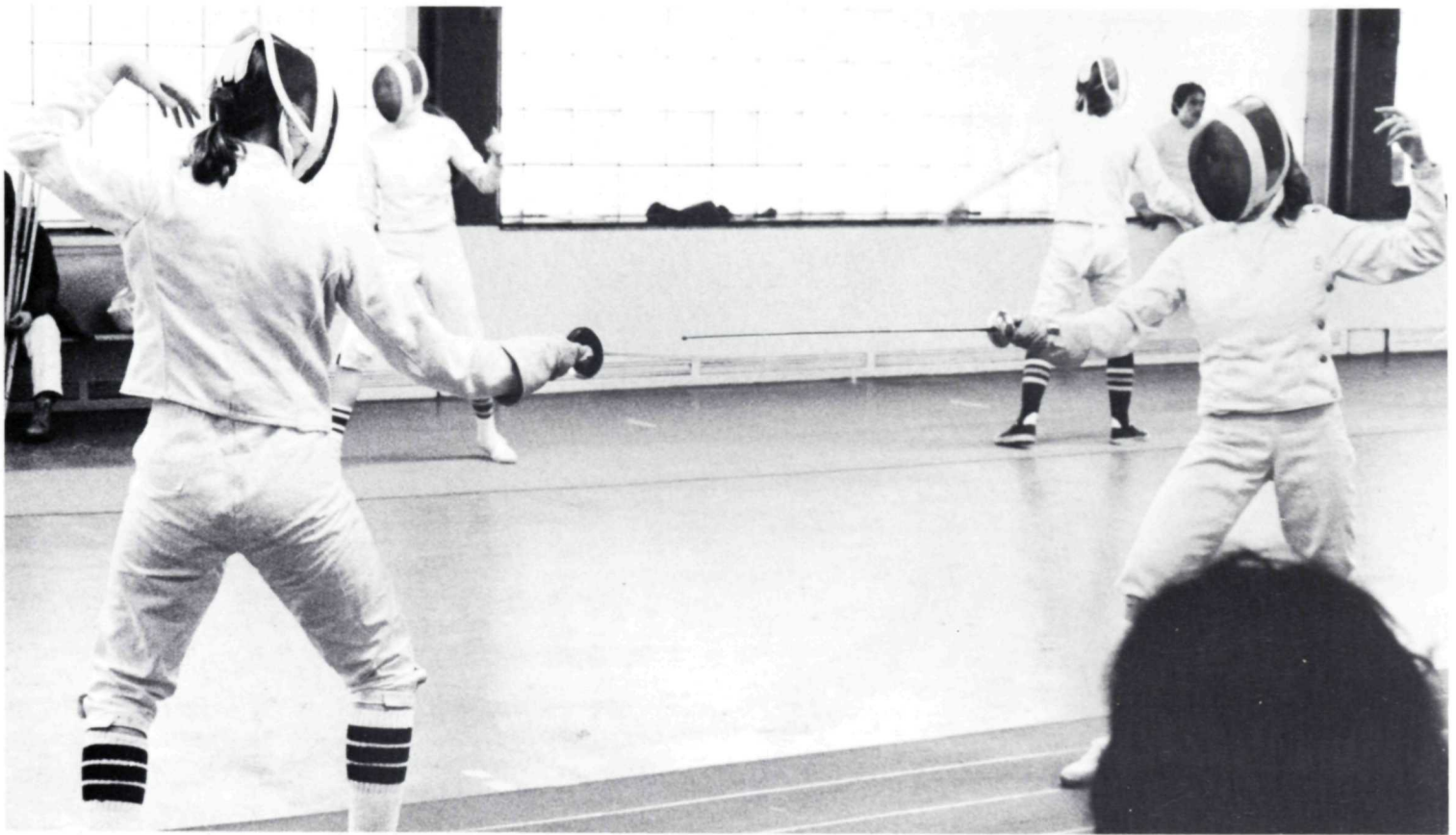


For the ninth consecutive year, Coach Menyher Kadar was successful in leading both the men's and women's fencing teams to winning seasons. The men finished with a 7-5 record which included triumphs over such schools as Purdue, Wisconsin, and Cleveland State. Leading the team were junior Darryl Vaci (epee, 8-1), and sophomores Dave Moss (foil, 5-4), and Andrei Radivoyevitch (sabre, 8-1).

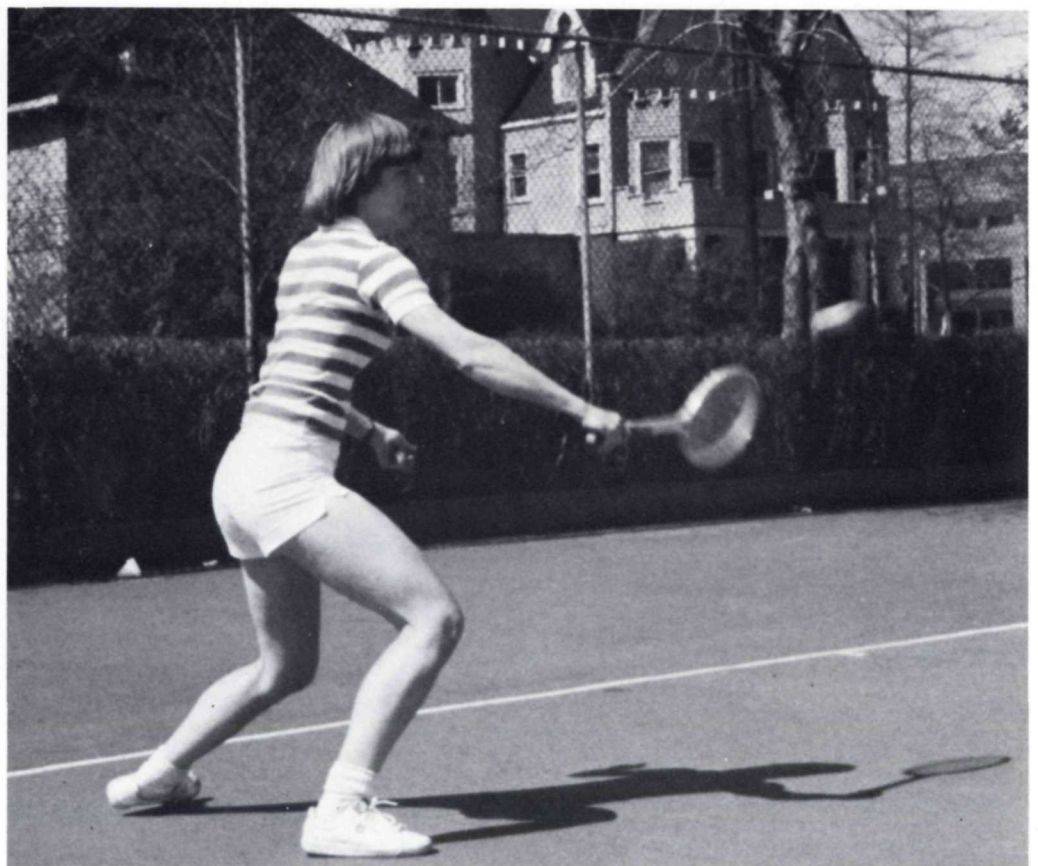
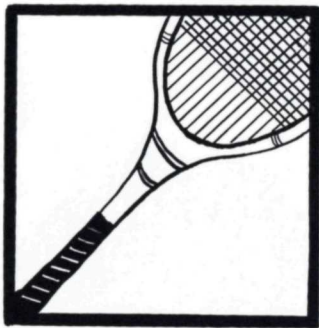
The women ended up with an 8-4 slate having beaten Miami, and Oberlin, but losing to Notre Dame. The top women were senior and captain Mary Jean Regalbuto, junior Liz Dienes, and junior Janet O'Brien.

Vaci was picked to be on the All-Midwest Intercollegiate Fencing Team and Dienes was named as the Ohio Collegiate Women's Champion.



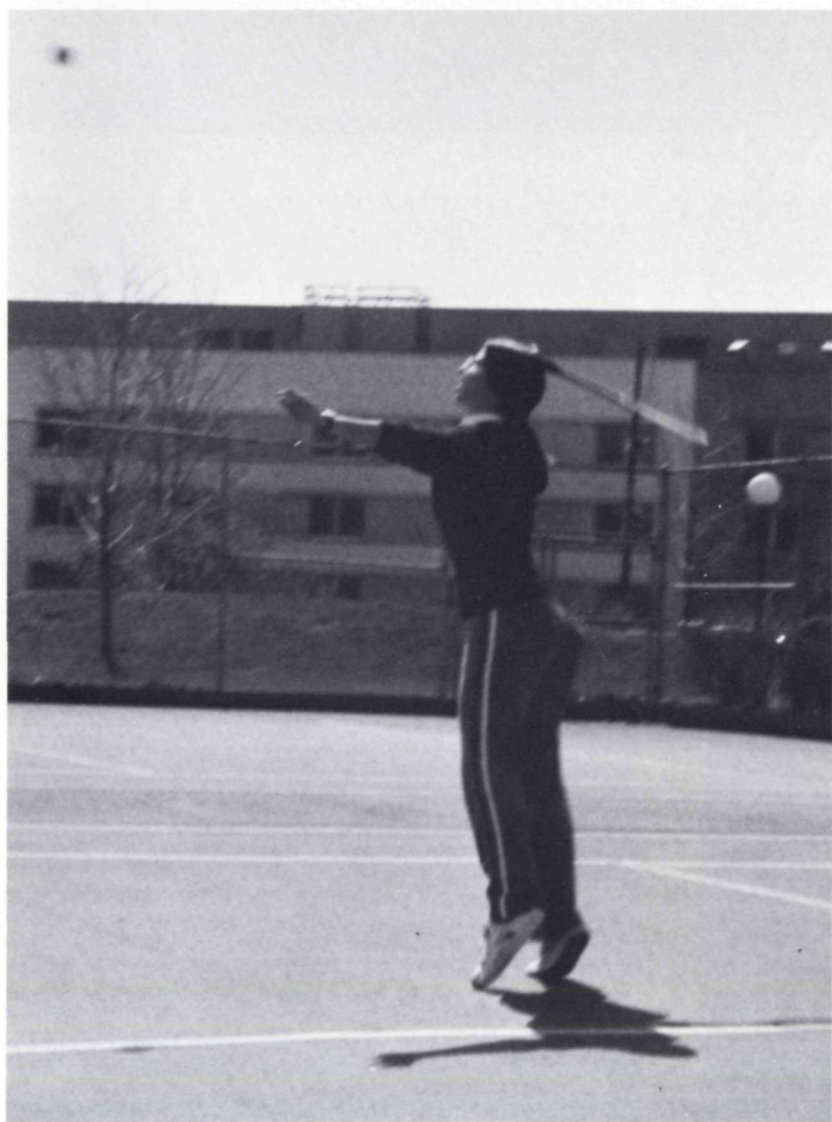

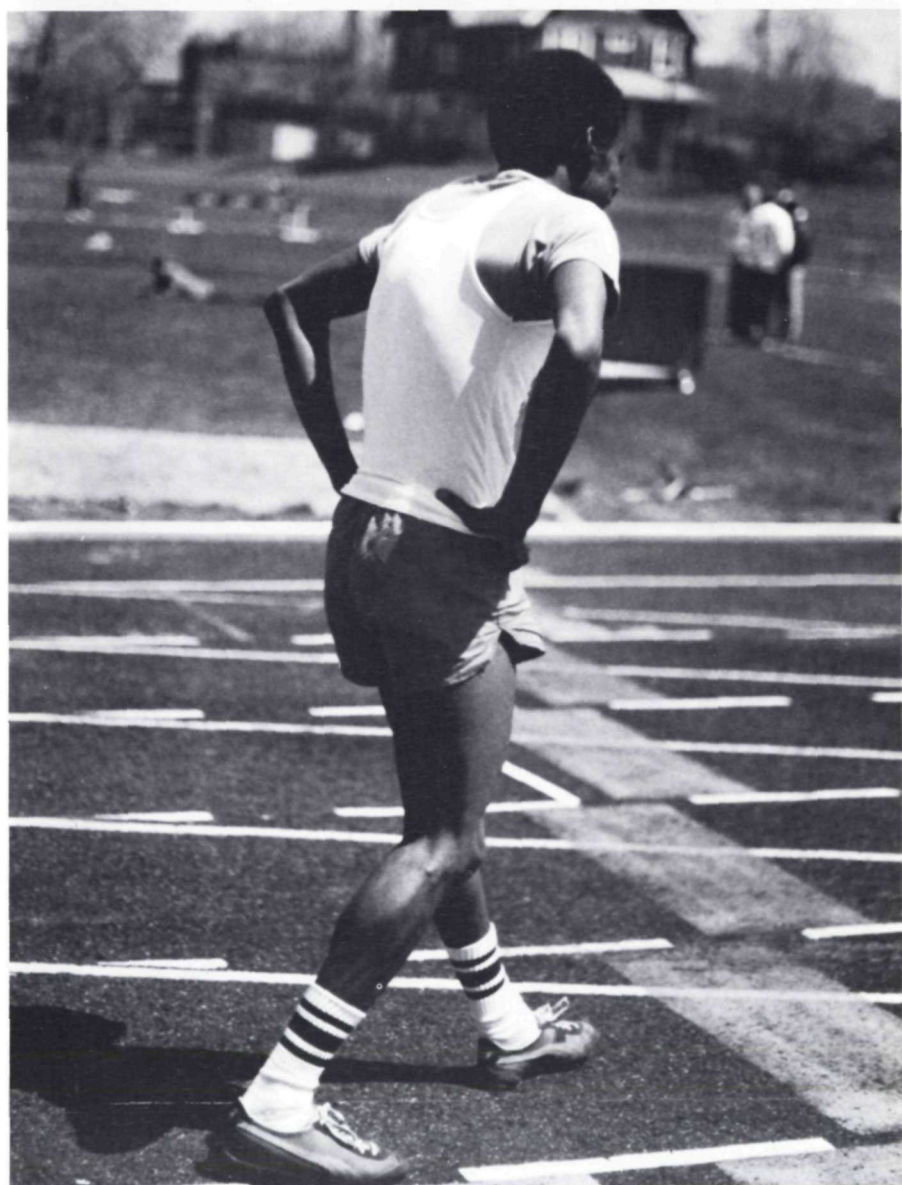


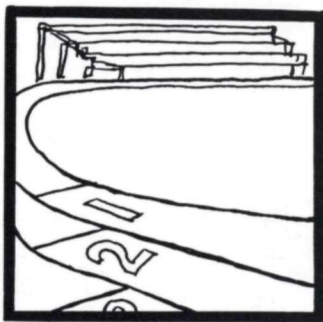




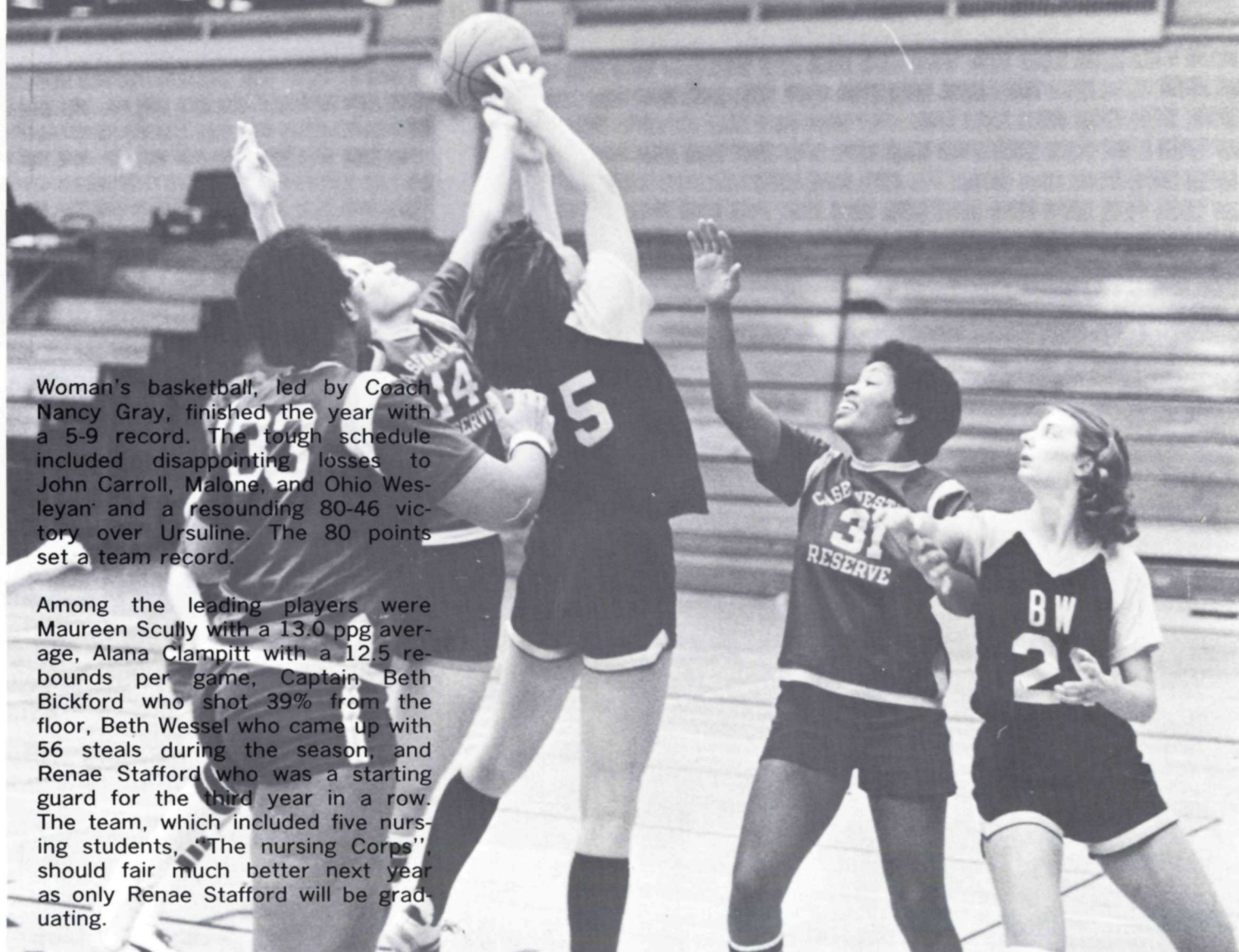
After winning nine of the last eleven track titles, Coach Bill Sudeck's thinclads placed third in PAC's won by Carnegie-Mellon, after notching a 4-1 season mark, and placing third in the city meet. Sophomore Doug Gergel set the pole vault record at 15'1" and was chosen as the team's outstanding performer. Peter Kummant, captain and MVP, was all PAC in the 10,000m and 5000m (14:40.2) runs as was Bob Tupta (Discus-146'6") and Gergel.

Kummant and Gergel both qualified for the NCAA championships and a chance for All-America Status. This would be Pete's second such honor if he makes it. Other fine performances include Andy Wasynczuck (javelin-201'5") and Bob Keenan (discus-142').



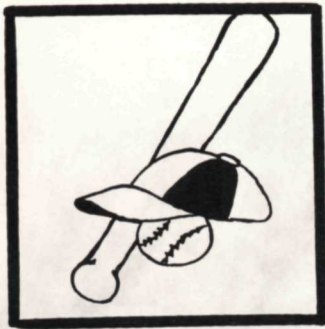






Woman's basketball, led by Coach Nancy Gray, finished the year with a 5-9 record. The tough schedule included disappointing losses to John Carroll, Malone, and Ohio Wesleyan and a resounding 80-46 victory over Ursuline. The 80 points set a team record.

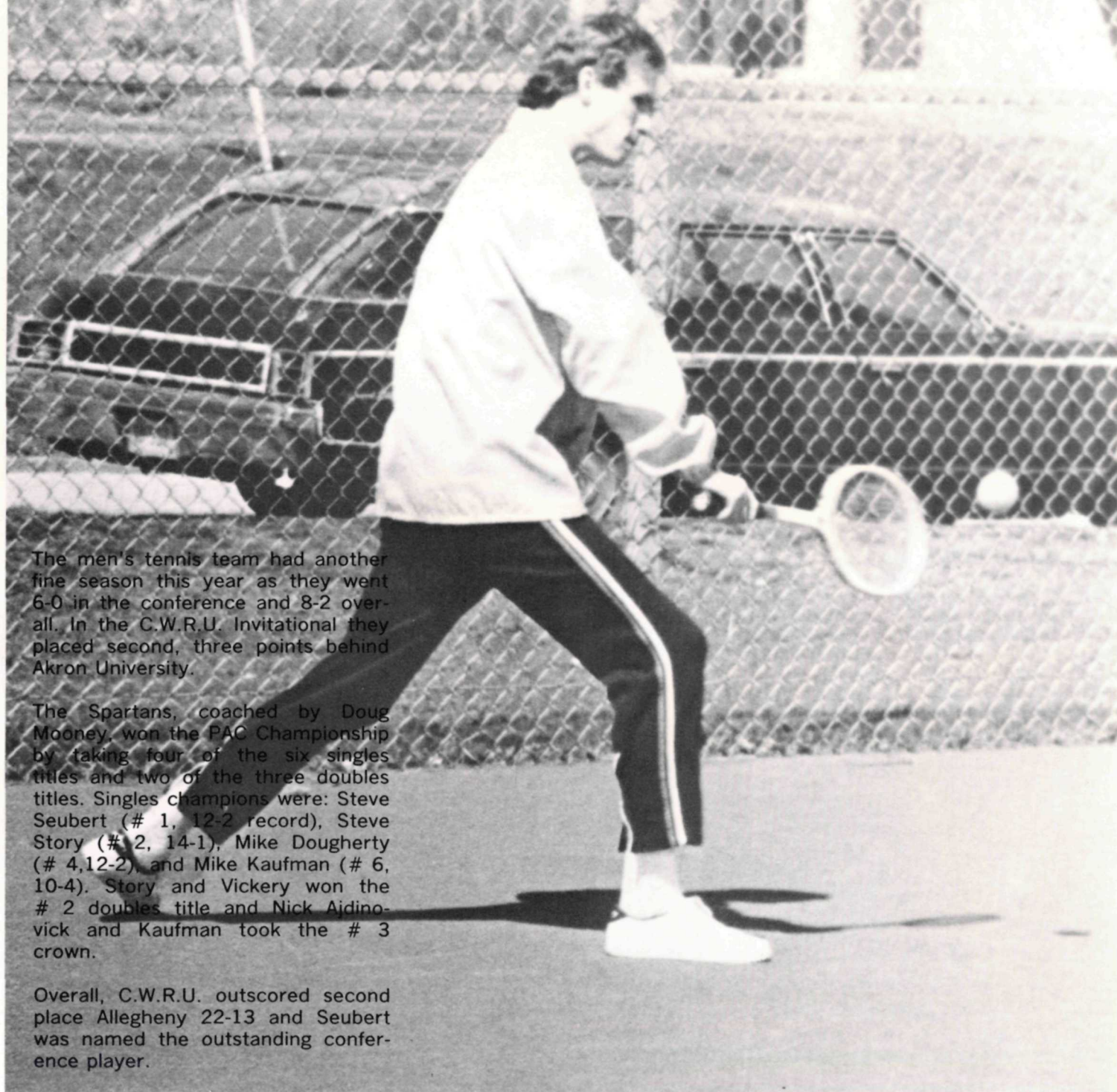
Among the leading players were Maureen Scully with a 13.0 ppg average, Alana Clampitt with a 12.5 rebounds per game, Captain Beth Bickford who shot 39% from the floor, Beth Wessel who came up with 56 steals during the season, and Renae Stafford who was a starting guard for the third year in a row. The team, which included five nursing students, "The nursing Corps", should fair much better next year as only Renae Stafford will be graduating.



Cries of "Wait until next year" are being sounded for Coach Del Rosa's baseball team as they look forward to a major improvement over the year's dismal 0-18 mark. They were 0-10 in the PAC.

The team's lack of pitching depth was compounded by an injury to Steve Miller who was All-PAC the last two years. Next year; however, there will be a solid base which includes eleven returning lettermen.

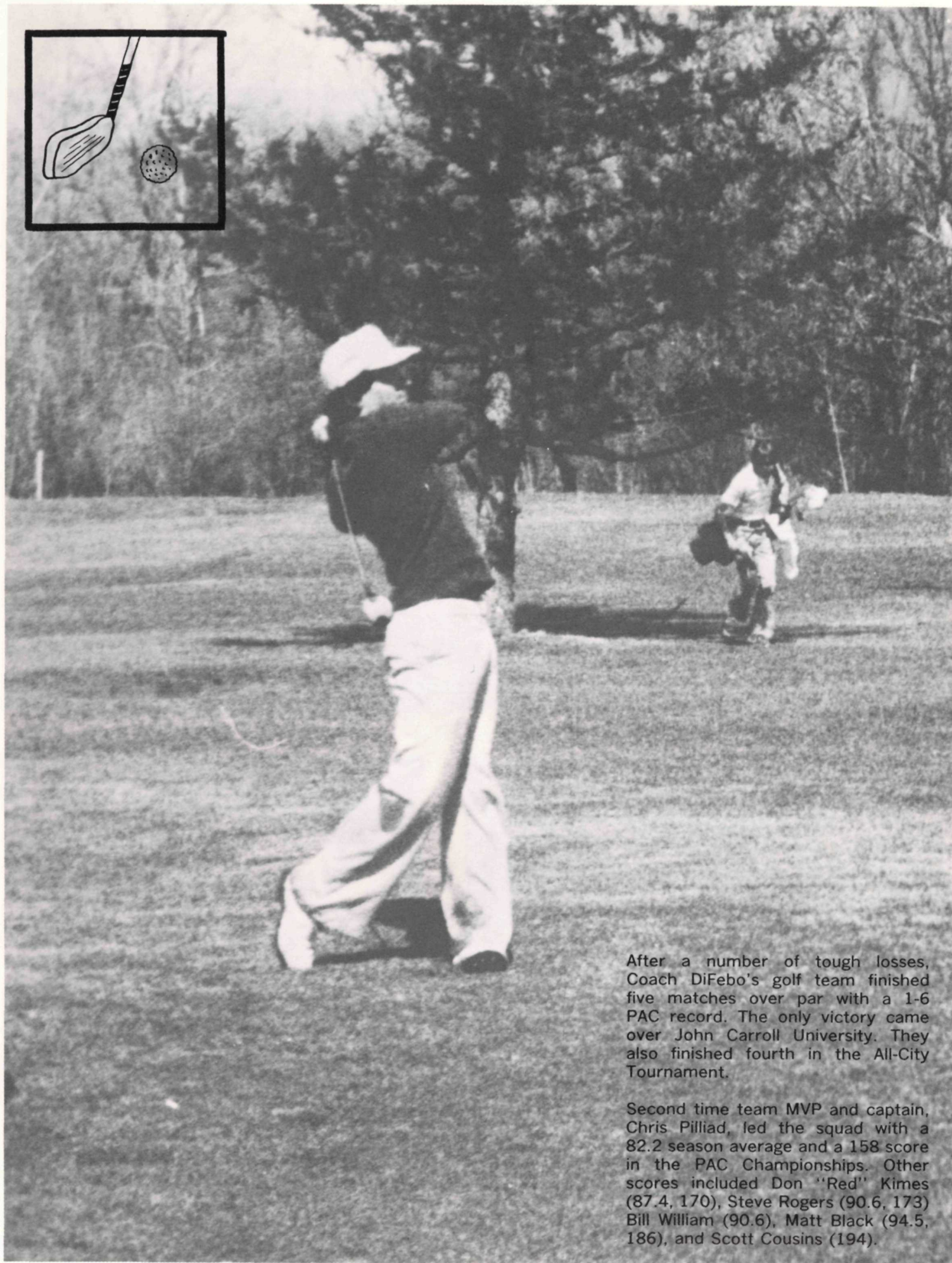
Top batsmen include John Lascda (.500 - 17/34). Mike Nathan (.348), Bob Cohn (.321, 2HR, 14 RBI's), and Mike Tan (.320). Overall, the team hit a healthy .288.



The men's tennis team had another fine season this year as they went 6-0 in the conference and 8-2 overall. In the C.W.R.U. Invitational they placed second, three points behind Akron University.

The Spartans, coached by Doug Mooney, won the PAC Championship by taking four of the six singles titles and two of the three doubles titles. Singles champions were: Steve Seubert (# 1, 12-2 record), Steve Story (# 2, 14-1), Mike Dougherty (# 4, 12-2), and Mike Kaufman (# 6, 10-4). Story and Vickery won the # 2 doubles title and Nick Ajdinovick and Kaufman took the # 3 crown.

Overall, C.W.R.U. outscored second place Allegheny 22-13 and Seubert was named the outstanding conference player.



After a number of tough losses, Coach DiFebo's golf team finished five matches over par with a 1-6 PAC record. The only victory came over John Carroll University. They also finished fourth in the All-City Tournament.

Second time team MVP and captain, Chris Pilliad, led the squad with a 82.2 season average and a 158 score in the PAC Championships. Other scores included Don "Red" Kimes (87.4, 170), Steve Rogers (90.6, 173) Bill William (90.6), Matt Black (94.5, 186), and Scott Cousins (194).

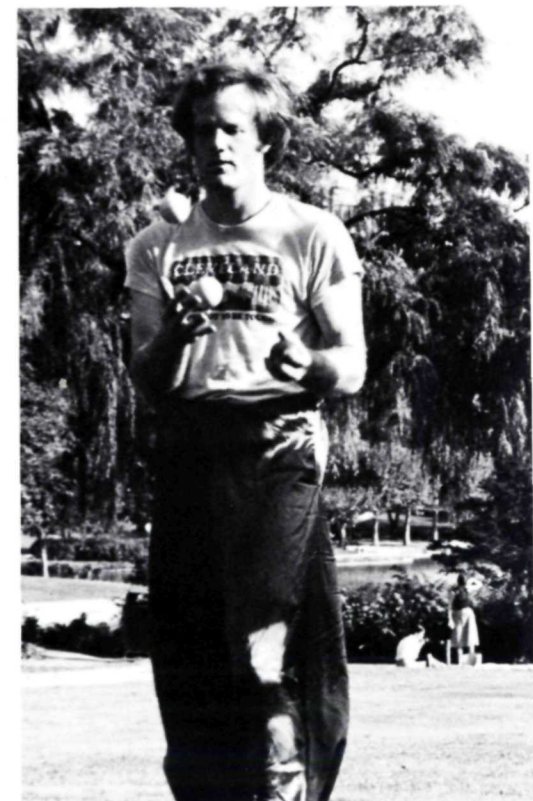


Freshmen Orientation

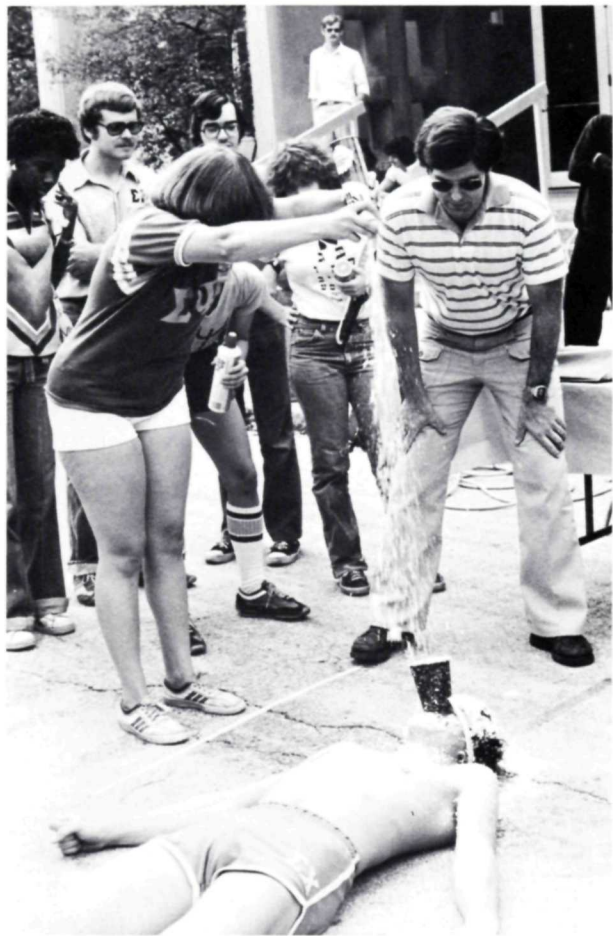

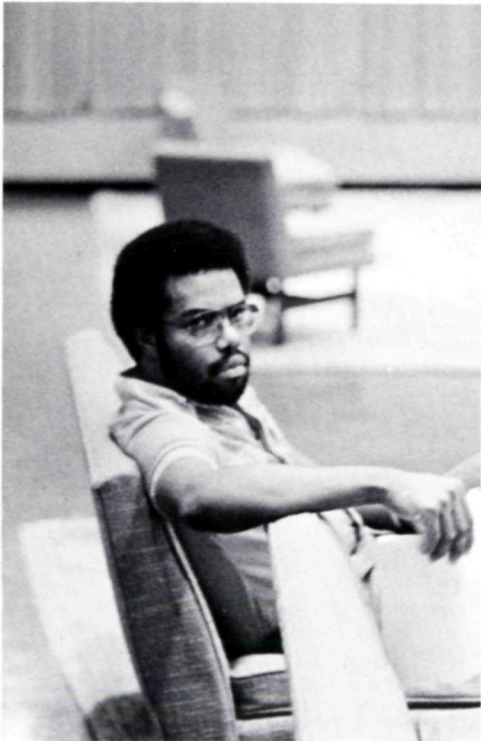
Nerds go ape over Animal House!

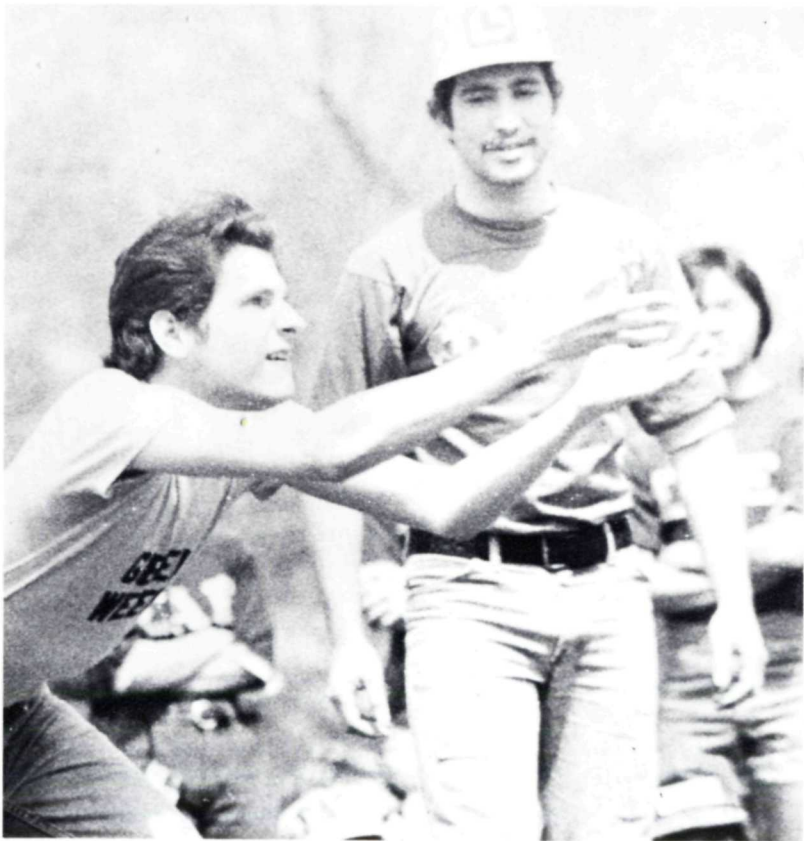


Greek Week

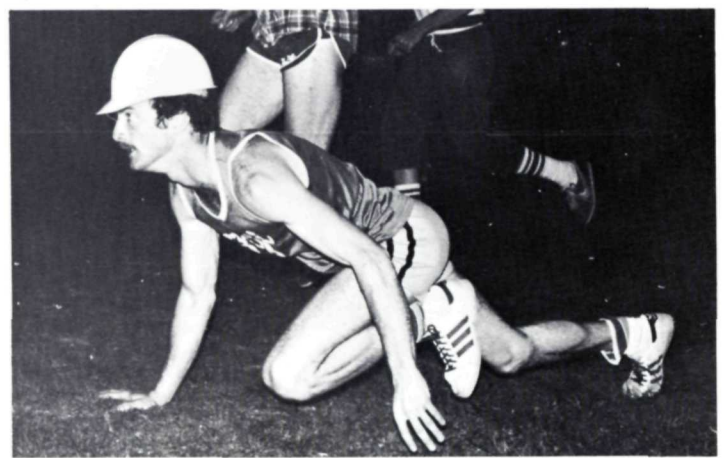
Saturday morning the Phi Delts churned a victory over Sigma Nu in the wheelbarrow race, while Zeta Psi demonstrated its dexterity by winning the egg toss. Then in the afternoon the rope pull proved to be a test of endurance for many of the teams. The longest match pitted the Fijis against the Phi Psis. The Fijis finally pulled out a victory in one hour and fifteen minutes. In the semi-final the Phi Delts claimed the quickest victory, ripping the rope out of the hands of their opponents in only 24 seconds. Then in the finals the Phis required about sixty seconds to defeat second place Zeta Psi. In the sorority division, Delta Phi Upsilon outpulled Sigma Psi in about thirty five minutes.





Finally came the last event: the bed race. SAE carried a 16 year old tradition of winning the race. At the time of the race, the Phi Delt's had already wrapped up first place but the event still drew a large crowd. Although many of this year's teams showed up with improved beds, the pre-race consensus was that the win would belong to either SAE or Phi Delta Theta. SAE drew the second heat, and blazed to a time of 35.1 seconds, eclipsing last year's record setting tune. However SAE celebration was short lived as the Phi Delt's crunched their record by setting a new one (35.0 seconds), thus ending the 16 year reign by SAE. The agony of defeat is here to stay in the SAE team for a long time.

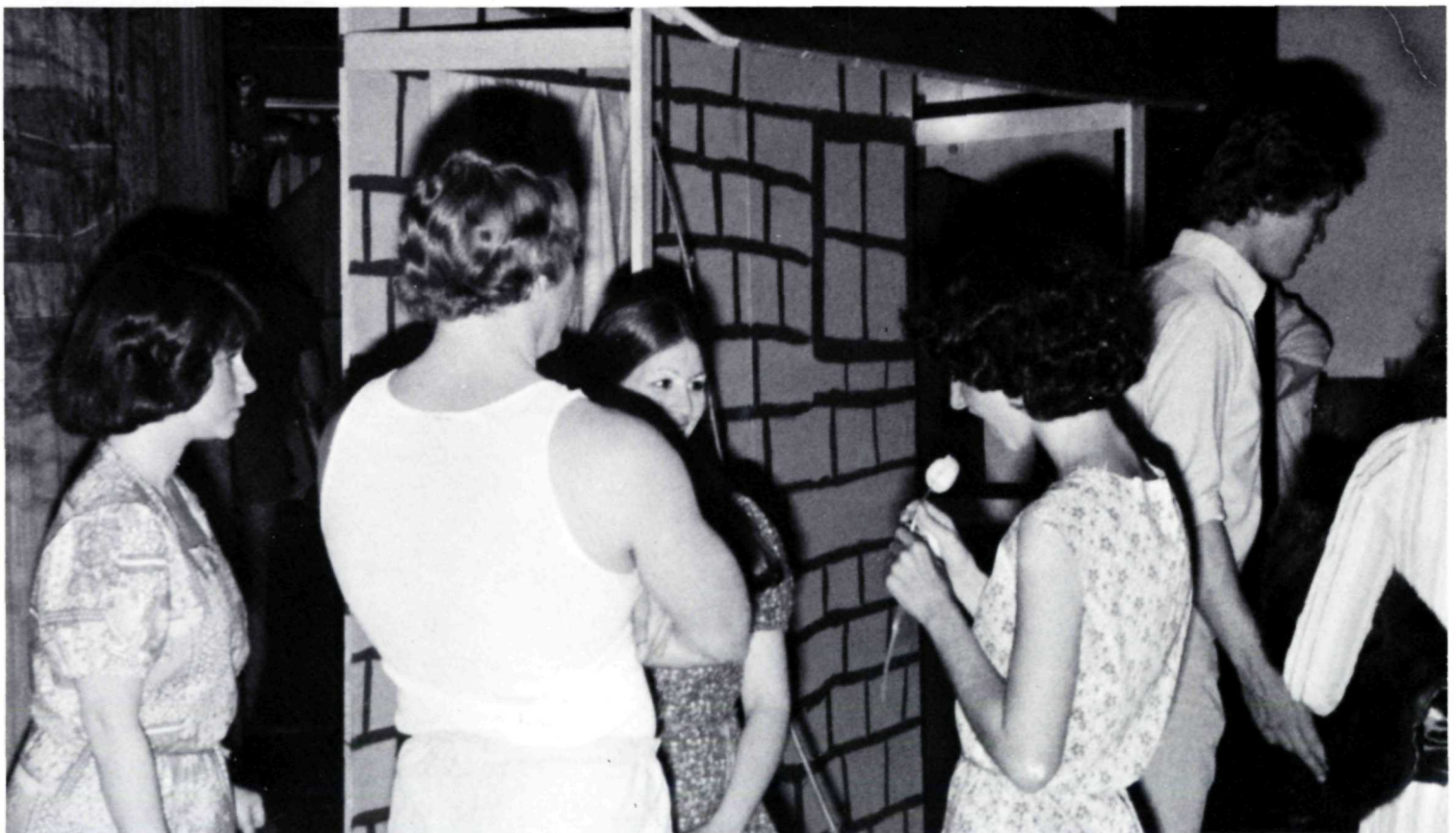


Theatre For All

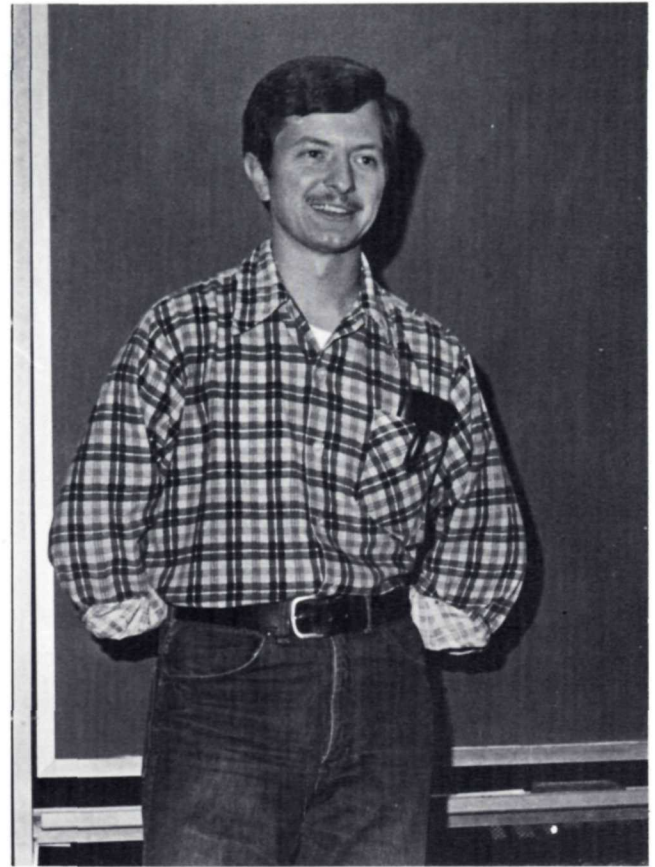
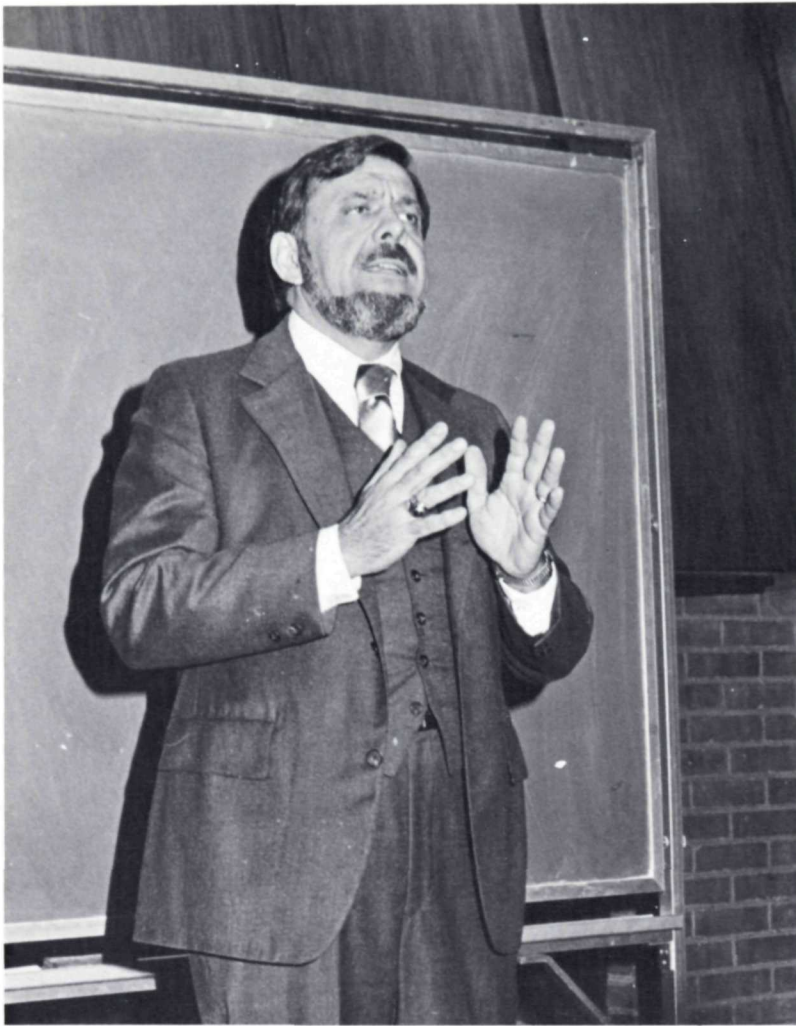
Case Glee Club

University Lecture Series





Ben Bradlee spends a lot of time talking, most editors do, it's part of the trade. He has the usual run-ins with business managers, he doesn't even allow them on his floor without his permission. He spends much money and time in court defending the First Amendment right to freedom of the press.

The Washington Post is considered one of the three best dailies in the country and their superior coverage of domestic affairs is unequivocal. Because of Bradlee? He will argue no. "Good newspapers are made by good owners, if you are lucky enough to have an owner who gives a damn, and Katherine Graham (publisher of the **Post**) does, you'll be a good editor. And although he is afforded almost total autonomy, he is still answerable to Graham. She is his superior and it was her 'okay' which put Watergate to print. Bradlee, the editors, and the lawyers had been conferring for hours, the editors arguing for publication, the lawyers advising against it. Bradlee finally phoned Graham, whose concurring vote ended the deliberation.

Ben Bradlee as Editor-in-Chief of **The Washington Post**, has arrived at certain conclusions about the responsibility of the press: "The power of the press to embarrass an administration is not only one of the lesser dangers of this Republic for which we all stand, but one of the virtues."

This year we based our theme on the idea of surrealism in order to show that this school could be described as 'unreal' when compared to other institutions. This school is quite unique, with many good and bad points.


